'Tis the Season: Flu Season!

The flu is a highly contagious respiratory illness that can have serious health consequences, especially for seniors. According to the U.S. Centers for Disease Control more than 60% of flurelated hospitalizations occur in people age 65 or older. In the United States, flu season occurs in the fall/winter. It starts as early as October, peaks in January or February, and ends as late as May.

The best way to prevent the flu is to get vaccinated. Annually researchers identify which strains of the virus will be most common during flu season. They then develop a vaccine that helps protect us from getting infected by these common strains. Because it takes about two weeks for immunity to develop, it's best to get a flu shot in early fall, before the flu season kicks into high gear.

Additional steps you can take to help prevent the flu include:


- Washing your hands often with soap and water or an alcohol-based hand rub.
- Avoiding touching your eyes, nose, or mouth

(germs spread this way).

- Avoiding close contact with sick people.
- Practicing good health habits (get plenty of sleep and exercise, manage your stress, drink plenty of fluids, and eat healthy food).
- Covering your nose and mouth with a tissue when you cough or sneeze (throw the tissue in the trash after you use it).
- Staying home if you are sick with flu-like illness for at least 24 hours after your fever is gone without the use of fever-reducing medicine.



Thanksgiving: Fact or Fiction

1. Fact or Fiction: Thanksgiving is held on the final Thursday each year.

Fiction. In 1863, President Abraham Lincoln designated the last Thursday in November as a national day of thanksgiving. However, in 1939, after a request from the Nation Retail Dry Good Association, President Franklin Roosevelt decreed that the holiday should always be celebrated on the fourth Thursday of the month (and never the occasional fifth, as occurred in 1939) in order to extend the holiday shopping for a week. The decision sparked great controversy, and was still unresolved two years later, when The House of Representatives passed a resolution making the last Thursday in November a national holiday. The Senate amended the resolution, setting the date as the fourth Thursday, and the House eventually agreed.

2.Fact or Fiction: One of America's Founding Fathers thought the turkey should be the national bird of the United States.

Fact. In a letter to his daughter sent in 1784, Benjamin Franklin suggested that the wild turkey would be a more appropriate national symbol for the newly independent United States than the bald eagle. He argues that the turkey was "a much more respectable bird", "a true original Native of America," and "though a little vain & silly, a Bird of Courage."

3. Fact or Fiction: Turkeys are slow-moving birds that lack the ability to fly.

Fiction (kind of). Domesticated turkeys cannot fly and their pace is limited to a slow walk. Female domestic turkeys, which are typically smaller and lighter than males, can move somewhat faster. Wild turkeys, on the other hand, are much smaller and more agile. They can reach speeds of up to 20-25 miles be hour on the ground and fly for short distances at speeds approaching 55 miles for hour. They also have better hearing than their domestic counterparts.

4. Fact or Fiction: The tradition of playing or watching football on thanksgiving started with the first National Football League game on the holiday in 1934.

Fiction. The American tradition of college football on Thanksgiving is pretty much as old as the sport itself. The American Intercollegiate Football Association held its first championship game on Thanksgiving Day in 1876. At the time, the sport resembled something between rugby and what we think of a football today. By the 1890's, more than 5,000 club, college and high school football games were taking place on Thanksgiving, and championship match-ups between schools like Princeton and Yale could draw up to 40,000 fans. The NFL took up the tradition in 1934, when the Detroit Lions played the Chicago Bears at the University of Detroit stadium in front of 26,000 fans. Since then, the Lions game on Thanksgiving has become an annual event, taking place every year except during the World War II years (1939-1944).


