

#### **Notes from the Administrator**

Dear Residents,

November is upon us and the season change is in full swing. As we transition to winter is very important we winterize the exterior hose spickets and we will be performing the furnace filter changes in the coming weeks. Look for your areas announcement for a specific date of installation. Maintenance can't complete this task if you have items blocking the closet door or in front of the furnace. Start to clean these areas of any obstacles that may impede their ability to change the furnace filters.

Also the snow could begin at anytime and we need to remind everyone to watch your step on the sidewalks and parking areas. All areas are cleared but not always completely ice free as it can form overnight and after snow melts. Also wet leaves on the paths and parking areas can be as slippery and ice so again please take your time and be careful. Report slippery areas to the office and they will be addressed asap. After a snow fall it is the responsibility of the residents to move their cars so the areas between the cars can be cleaned and salted. If you do not move your car after a snow fall these areas will not be accessible. We are currently looking for volunteers to assist our residents in moving vehicles after a snow fall. If you are interested and can help please contact Judy Shatto from the Resident Council, or our offices to sign up. We are including a copy of the snow removal policy with all the details of how the process works and resident responsibilities.

The maintenance staff and management are putting out the call for help! We recently installed brand new dumpsters with side plastic easy slide doors so no more pushing the tops open to throw your trash away. Please help us keep the campus clean by using the sliding door and not depositing your garbage bags on the ground inside the enclosure. It becomes unsanitary and attracts raccoons, skunks and other wildlife to those areas. If you need help just call the office and we can assist you or ask a neighbor maybe to help out, thank you.

If you have not had an opportunity to meet our new Service Coordinator, Sue Carney please take a minute to reach out or return her call as she works to meet all of you. Sue comes to the Village with a lifetime of resource contacts and assistance opportunities. How can she help you?

Check all of your assets out. You may find that you are worth more than when the original will was created. And you may very likely be worth more than you realized!

I have heard of many bad situations which could have been averted with proper planning. In one instance a son with a brother in Australia had to deal with an emergency admission of both parents at a memory facility; and it took several days to track down the needed information. It all happened on the weekend of course so dealing with insurance companies and banks was not possible until that following Monday. In another instance the father was exceptionally well organized in almost every way. Having come from a field of finance, he had all of the financials and insurance information organized and readily available except for the fact that he had forgotten to give his family the computer password to access everything. When he passed away it took several days to get to the information. His grandson figured it out since his grandpa had taught him how to store and back up his own systems. He knew his modus operandi!

Both of these situations could have been avoided if total planning had occurred. So there is never a more important time to be prepared than planning for your family to assume control of your affairs.

# **Tips for Protecting Yourself from Identity Theft**

Identity theft – when someone steals your personal identifying information for financial gain – is a fast growing crime epidemic. Data breaches at major companies have exposed billions of personal records, putting all of us at risk that someone will use our information to steal from us or others. Here are steps you can

take to protect your identity from scammers.


- 1. Make sure all of your financial institutions have your current address and contact information so you can receive statements in a timely manner.
- **2.** When you receive your statements, make sure to
- review them carefully within a few days of receipt, so if you are a victim of identity theft, you can report it immediately.
- 3. If using a debit card, it's wise to use automated phone systems weekly at your bank to check transaction history and monitor accounts.
- 4. Create strong passwords and PIN numbers and keep all personal and private information in a secure location.

If you use a computer, consider setting up electronic access to your financial accounts so that you can check for suspicious activity more often than getting monthly statements in the mail. Also consider freezing your credit with the three major credit bureaus, so that someone cannot open an account in your name. A new law makes this process free with the three major credit bureaus: Experian, Equifax and TransUnion.

# **Phone Scams Abound: How to Protect Yourself**

Despite the many ways scammers have to target us these days, the traditional telephone call is still the route of choice for criminals. The Federal Trade Commission says that the telephone was the method of contact for 70% of reported scam complaints last year. Here are the phone scams our Fraud Watch Helpline trained volunteers hear about most often:

- > The government impostor:
  Someone claiming to be from the IRS calls and threatens your arrest if you don't immediately pay back taxes.
  Or a caller from Medicare claims you need to pay a fee for your new Medicare card.
  Know that the government is not going to call you and demand payment and they will not ask you to share personal information. These calls are scams and it's OK to simply hang up.
- > The grandchild in a bind:
  You get a frantic call from
  your supposed grandchild
  who's in a jam (pulled over for
  drunk driving, car accident,
  in jail, or some such fiasco)
  and they need you to wire
  money immediately, and they
  beg you not to tell anyone.
  These calls are emotionally
  devastating and most
  likely fake. It's OK to hang up

and call the grandchild or another family member to find out if this is a legitimate emergency.

> The prize scam: You've seen the TV spot where the Publisher's Clearing House arrives at someone's door to announce they've won millions in the Publisher's Clearing House sweepstakes, right? That's exactly how this prize is awarded. You will not get a phone call or a letter saying you've won — especially if you didn't enter the sweepstakes. If you ever learn you've "won" a prize but

have to pay a fee to claim it – know that it's a scam.

If you get a call that makes you uncomfortable or seems questionable, it's OK to simply hang up. Or, you can create a refusal script that gets you off the phone, like, "I'm sorry, I can't talk right now. I'm visiting with Officer Walker at the moment. Goodbye." Then hang up the phone. Report the call to the Federal Trade Commission at 1-877-382-4357. It's important to report the calls so the authorities can identity trends and go after the criminals.


# Thursday, November 9th, Shakespeare in Love:

# **Snow Removal Policy**

- 1. Snow removal from roads and walkways should be completed by 11 AM on snow days when there is a two inch or more accumulation. There MAY be a delay on weekends and holidays.
- 2. Snow removal from the parking areas will be as follows:

A. Residents MUST remove snow from their vehicles and move their vehicles as directed by maintenance. This will allow the contractor ample space to maneuver equipment and efficiently clean away snow and spread salt.

All vehicles need to be moved to an area that has been cleaned out by 10:00 AM.

If the resident is unable to remove his/her vehicle for MAJOR health reasons, he/she must make prior arrangements with someone to move their vehicles to another location during snow removal.

- B. If resident plans to be away from the property overnight or for a vacation and will be leaving his/her vehicle parked in front of their building, he/she must notify the office with the name and telephone number of the person who will be responsible in their absence in case of an emergency.
- C. If after snow removal has been completed and your parking area is still icy, please let management know. We can order additional salting for your safety.
- D. Inoperable vehicles are not allowed on the property. If they are not removed, they will be towed at the car owner's expense.

Questions and concerns about snow removal should always be brought to the attention of management. Management does recommend that residents purchase a small amount of salt (that should be stored inside) for emergency use.

Resident safety is always a priority with maintenance and management. Residents need to take extra precautions during cold, icy and wet weather. Please dress warmly and wear snow boots or shoes that grip the ground better. Please remember to always report black ice, water puddles and other slippery spots.

We cannot be everywhere at once, but with your help, conditions will be much safer for all!
