#### Life Without a Car - Part 2

In last month's column I shared that due to some minor repair work I spent a little over a week without a car, yet still had things to do and places to be. Heeding the advice of my daughter's boyfriend, I decided to look for apps I could download onto my smartphone that would help address this dilemma.

Starting with transportation, I essentially had two options: Lyft and Uber. Both connect you to people who - for a

small fee – use their personal cars to take you places. Because I was a first time user, Lyft offered me \$5 off my first eleven rides so logically I chose them. I went to Apple's online App Store and within seconds had the free app downloaded on to my iPhone. After entering my contact information - and of course a valid credit card - I was all set to start using the app.


The next morning, when I was ready for work I launched the app, en-

tered the address of where I need-

ed to go and in less than a minute was notified that a driver was on his way to pick me up. I was provided with the driver's name and photograph, along with the make and model - and picture - of the car he was driving and its license plate number. He arrived in just under six minutes. Through the app, through use of an avatar I could actually watch his car make its way to my home.

The car was clean and in good condition and the driver was friendly. The ride to work took no longer than usual and cost a little over a \$1 per mile. When I factored in my car payment, the cost of gas and insurance, and the cost of repairs and depreciation I discovered that if I took 1 to 2 short rides per day (6 – 10 miles) the cost was only slightly more than what I pay to use my own car. It was definitely cheaper than a taxi or renting a car and it was extremely convenient. I used Lyft the rest of the week and the longest I had to wait for a ride was 9 minutes.

Next month I'll share how I was able to go grocery shopping without leaving the comfort of my couch.








#### **An Early Birthday/Christmas Gift**

Whose photo is she admiring?

Most people have relatives, but some are born without family. Such was the case of an infant the morning of December 23rd, in the Great Depression year of 1932. There was no one to lay claim when a Detroit boarding house landlady called police to take the newborn to old St. Mary's hospital. Despite her picture being on the front page of The Detroit Times, Christmas Eve, Children's Aid Society had to place "Jane Doe" in foster care.

Three years later, a kindly older couple in the suburbs agreed to foster her. She was named Gail and was raised in their loving care into adulthood as an only child. After high school, Gail's "father" suffered a heart attack so Gail helped maintain their home by doing secretarial work while attending Wayne State U for a teaching degree. In her thirties,



Gail married her high school classmate Bill Holmes. They had two children, Peter and Susan. When they were in middle school, her husband had an aneurism, leaving Gail to raise the children alone.

This year Peter surprised Gail and Susan with Ancestry DNA kits. The results were completely unexpected. They showed that Gail shares a father with two half sisters in Northern Michigan. Thanks to a newfound cousin in California for discovering the match. Although they knew nothing of Gail's existence, she has been warmly accepted. Gail is driving up north as you read this to meet her sisters in person and to enjoy more than just their photograph.

Gail shares her story with friends and neighbors at Oakland Woods because DNA testing for laymen is so new. She hopes to encourage others to pursue this course of action to fill a void that is always present. Three years ago Gail moved to Oakland Woods and truly appreciates life here. Peter and Susan live nearby and are always loving and helpful.

#### The Village of Oakland Woods

#### **Snow Removal Policy**

- 1. Snow removal from roads and walkways should be completed by 11 AM on snow days when there is a two inch or more accumulation. There MAY be a delay on weekends and holidays.
- 2. Snow removal from the parking areas will be as follows:

A. Residents MUST remove snow from their vehicles and move their vehicles as directed by maintenance. This will allow the contractor ample space to maneuver equipment and efficiently clean away snow and spread salt.

All vehicles need to be moved to an area that has been cleaned out by 10:00 AM.


If the resident is unable to remove his/her vehicle for MAJOR health reasons, he/she must make prior arrangements with someone to move their vehicles to another location during snow removal.

- B. If resident plans to be away from the property overnight or for a vacation and will be leaving his/her vehicle parked in front of their building, he/she must notify the office with the name and telephone number of the person who will be responsible in their absence in case of an emergency.
- C. If after snow removal has been completed and your parking area is still icy, please let management know. We can order additional salting for your safety.
- D. Inoperable vehicles are not allowed on the property. If they are not removed, they will be towed at the car owner's expense.

Questions and concerns about snow removal should always be brought to the attention of management. Management does recommend that residents purchase a small amount of salt (that should be stored inside) for emergency use.

Resident safety is always a priority with maintenance and management. Residents need to take extra precautions during cold, icy and wet weather. Please dress warmly and wear snow boots or shoes that grip the ground better. Please remember to always report black ice, water puddles and other slippery spots.

We cannot be everywhere at once, but with your help, conditions will be much safer for all!
