

World Elder Abuse Awareness Day

Each year, an estimated 5 million older adults are abused, neglected, or exploited. Older Americans lose an estimated \$2.6 billion or more annually due to elder financial abuse and exploitation, funds that could be used to pay for basic needs such as housing, food, and medical care. Unfortunately, it occurs in every demographic and can happen to anyone—a family member, a neighbor, even you. It is estimated that only one in five of these crimes are discovered.

World Elder Abuse Awareness Day (WEAAD) was launched on June 15, 2006, by the International Network for the Prevention of Elder Abuse and the World Health Organization at the United Nations (UN). WEAAD aims to provide an opportunity for communities around the world to promote a better understanding of abuse and neglect of older persons by raising awareness of the cultural, social, economic, and demographic processes affecting elder abuse and neglect. In addition, WEAAD is held in support of the UN International Plan of Action acknowledging the significance of elder abuse as a public health and human rights issue. This observance serves as a call-to-action for individuals, organizations, and communities to raise awareness about elder abuse, neglect, and exploitation.

It is important for all of us to look out for our most vulnerable citizens. If you suspect foul play, Speak Up! Call the elder abuse hotline with Adult Protective Services at (855) 444-3911. You can remain anonymous. Stop the abuse and exploitation of our seniors. It's everyone's responsibility.



Kitchen Fire Safety Tips

There is nothing better than a home cooked meal. Whether it's a family classic or something new, all recipes should include these safety tips. Many will say that being safe is just common sense and this is a waste of time. However, reviewing safety is never a waste of time considering kitchen-cooking fires are the top cause of fires and injuries in dwellings for the last 10 years.

Keep Looking when Cooking!



- Unattended cooking is the most common type of kitchen fire. (62% involved cooktops)
- Use a timer for stovetop simmering & oven cooking.
- Never leave your apartment while cooking
- Never cook while sleepy, taking medication that makes you drowsy, or drinking.
- Double Check Oven and Burners are off when you are done cooking.
- Turn pot handles away from the stove's edge.
- Always keep a lid nearby.
- > Small Fires:

Slide the pan lid over the pan. Turn off the burner. Do not move the pan. Keep the lid on until the pan has cooled.

PVM Risk Management: 05/03/2023

- Keep cooking area clear.
- Place paper towels, oven mitts, towels, food packaging, and wood utensils away from the stove top.
- Clean off the stove before and after cooking.
- Do not store items in your oven or on top of the stove.
